On behalf of the English Table Tennis Association (ETTA) many congratulations on the Club reaching 75 years since it started.

The Club has made excellent contributions to our great sport from the work they do in the community and via the Leagues, County, Region and at National Level.

These many and significant contributions have been recognised by many partners including the ETTA, who with support from Sport England assisted the Club financially in a major venue upgrade which has resulted in both major increases in membership and enabled the Club to expand its many initiatives and programmes for its members and within the community.

These programmes include players from juniors to veterans at all levels and abilities.

The ETTA is involved in a number of new programmes and initiatives including "Ping!" which has taken place in London, Birmingham and Hull, "Change for Life", providing free equipment and coaching in over 750 schools in conjunction with Schools Sports Partnerships. CONGRATULATIONS FROM NMTTL TO ELLENBOROUGH ON THIS AUSPICIOUS OCCASION

I have been entrusted to write a piece for this brochure from the point of view of Ellenborough's relationship with NMTTL. The club has been in continuous membership of the league since before the Second World War and, from humble beginnings, rose to be a power in the game. However I will introduce myself by saying that I am in the nature of being a sort of honorary member of the club as well as being President of the league. I left my home town of Brighton in about 1960 and joined the club then known as West Green which later evolved into Edmonton TTC. My first association with Ellenborough came when I was recruited into the Central League club, known as Bishopsgate, by my friend George Harris. I discovered that a fellow member of the club was David Hope who played in the first team with Tony Piddock and Terry Kirby. As the years went by my path crossed with Ellenborough's ever increasing frequency and I am now serving as a volunteer involved in supervising various tournaments here and as such have been elected to serve on the committee of this club.

Therefore embarking on the task which has been given to me, I would like as an Edmonton person, but also a loyal Ellenborough supporter, to congratulate the club on achieving longevity in years and to hope, that many more years of service to the sport of table tennis will be provided by it, and more successes by its members.

You may be interested to know that in the season 1978/9 the league consisted of 16 divisions and in these Ellenborough fielded no fewer than 21 teams! Top of the averages was England No. 2 Graham Sandley, second Colin Wilson and third Bob Potton.

Moving on to the season completed earlier this year, hearty congratulations to Ellenborough 1 for winning the Premier division 1. The heroes were the Proffitt brothers Jonathan and Simon this time with a huge assist from a player with his second spell with the club, Keith Fung, and to add to the plaudits those three finished as the top three in the divisional averages. However, they had better watch out for hard on their heels are the juniors, the stars of tomorrow, and some teenagers who are stars already such as Bradley Tuttle, Daniel Wright and Sam Cowan to mention but three. The aforementioned trio were barred from taking part in the four days each of the National Junior and National Cadet leagues having been members of a British League squad. Those who did play for the Junior "A" team were Ryan Gaveglia, Ryan Williams, Beau Durman and Anthony Close which did well to finish third in Division 1. Ellenborough fielded four other squads, all of whom performed valiantly gaining valuable competition experience.

The same squad with the addition of up and coming Arif Ahmet played in the Cadet League finishing a gallant second to London Academy "A" both having the same record, Played 14, Won 13, but London Academy won 102 sets against Ellenborough's 97, a brilliant effort nevertheless.

For the first time in many years, the annual closed tournament was held over a weekend and it was considered by the majority to be preferable to the weekday evening's format. Bolstered by last minute 'phone calls and frantic e-mails, a situation all too common these days, a reasonable number entered and seemed to enjoy a satisfactory experience. Hitherto I have not mentioned the Ladies and Junior girls who are making their presence felt both locally and nationally. Featuring in the Ellenborough's closed tournament were Denise Payet, Samantha Lai, Sureyya Eydin, Rosetta Delisle all of whom left their mark.

And so on to the next 75 years when no doubt Ellenborough will continue to do as well in the future as it has done in the past.

1936 AND ALL THAT

That there was a group of table tennis players, who, before 1936, regarded themselves as "Ellenborough" is a matter of record. However the club officially came into existence in 1936 according to life member Tom Chapman who, with his brothers, had a great deal to do with both the building and formation of the club. Our club was very much the junior partner in the then successful Ellenborough Lawn Tennis Club which played on grass courts, in Wood Green, White Hart Lane near to the now defunct Haringey Athletics Stadium and for those with a long memory the "Wonderloaf" bakery. Tom and his brothers borrowed £25.00 from their mother to purchase an empty pavilion on another part of the playing fields, dismantled it plank by plank, and then re-assembled it for use as the tennis club's headquarters. A single table was installed, principally used to pass the time away when players could not get out onto the courts due to bad weather, and from humble beginning a more serious attitude to our game developed.

So it came to pass a team was entered in the recently formed North Middlesex Table Tennis League (1932) and our competitive history began. By one of those strange co-incidences one encounters in life, the centre spot for measuring the league's boundaries was the George Spicer school ", not a stone's throw from where the club is today. Perhaps there is something in the air or water around here! Pre war each match consisted of a five man team playing a single set against each of the opposition. The ladies had their own divisions which were eventually dispensed with after one of longest and most boring A.G.M's I have ever had the misfortune to attend. Our team started its campaign in the 1937/8 season in Division 4 West, and did not exactly set the world alight, finishing 5th in the division with a record of:-

Played 16, Won 10, Lost 6, For 224, Against 176, Points Gained 29. The very first match was against Venture A, which we lost by 14 to 11. Team Captain, Harry Reid.

The advent of World War 2 saw the league struggle on in much the same way, I suspect, as other sporting activities with friendlies being arranged whenever troops were on leave. Those who were not called up did their bit to keep things going so that a structure would be ready when hostilities ceased. One such person was Wilf. Carter who apart from being Ellenborough's Secretary and Treasurer ran the NMTTL on his own for the duration of the war. Many club members will be aware of the enormous contribution both Wilf and his wife Mabel made to the club before they retired, prematurely, to Seaford on the south coast, in the late 1950's. His contribution is remembered by the annual award of the Wilf Carter trophy to the player who achieves the highest average in any division of NMTTL. My own club in the NMTTL which I joined when still at school in I think 1951 was West Green TTC perversely situated in the Conservative Club at Edmonton Green. However the club had a huge internal bust up and just before I went to serve her majesty (National Service) I became a member of Ellenborough by now a force to be reckoned with. Playing in the Bowes Pavilion situated in the middle of Tottenhall Sports Ground in Palmers Green, was an experience most people will never forget. Colder than the North Pole in winter, (you could see outside through the knot holes in the single pine wood planks of which it was constructed) nevertheless it was a hotbed of the local game despite at first having only one useable table and one other with hardly any run back for practise. There were 10 league teams, the maximum possible with only one match table used every night. Sunday morning was for practice and often a handicap tournament took place in the springtime, when the ETTA's Grand National Lottery tickets were won as prizes.

And now a Michael Caine moment as in "not many people know that", after completing my National Service in the R.A.F., I resumed my membership of Ellenborough only to find that all the those players that two years ago, I could beat comfortably, now demolished my feeble efforts with the fiendish new invention, the sponge bat. I was so demoralised that I actually packed up playing for several months. It took a telephone call from Alan Giles asking why I had not been seen at the club recently to make me resume playing the game.

The conversation was along the lines of "Oh I can't play against sponge" (a conclusion incidentally many players reached) "so I've packed up". Alan replied "Well why not buy a sponge bat yourself; if you can't beat 'em join 'em". Which I did and the rest is history. Probably the most important event that happened soon after the sponge era was the decision to increase the playing capacity of the club by knocking down a partition wall and installing another match table. This meant we could now run 20 league teams which was possible because

you played alternately home and away each week with two matches taking place each night of the week. Harold Webb, or current President joined the club in 1962 and I am leaving it to him to bring you up to date.

Finally during my research for this article I have noticed 1936 was a great year for start ups, innovations and bizarre events, so here are some of them: - I am not quite sure into which category you may wish to place the first but I was born on 25th June 1936, reluctant to enter the world as told by my mother. I must have known what was coming! Second, the football club that I played for, Southgate Olympic was founded in 1936, as was Middlesex County Bridge Association of which I am a member. Other notable events in 1936, in no particular order were, Television started at Alexander Palace, The Hoover Dam formerly known as the Boulder Dam opened and Crystal Palace went up in flames. "Gone with the wind" was published, written by Margaret Mitchell (sorry not Mark and Angela's mum) Edward VIII abdicated after marrying Mrs Simpson, and Roosevelt was elected for a second term. War was in the air with the Spanish Civil leading the way, Hitler broke the Treaty of Versailles" and we ordered 310 Spitfires to be built. On the sporting front it was a memorable time with Jesse Owens getting up Hitler's nose by winning four gold medals at the Berlin Olympics and to my chagrin (being a Spurs supporter) Arsenal won the F.A. cup beating Sheffield United 1 - 0 (Terry Wilson please note!) The Spurs had been relegated the previous season and finished 5th in division 2, where they stayed until 1950/51. On the cricket field England snatched defeat from the jaws of victory (again!) against the Aussies in Australia. They lead the series by 2 - 0 and contrived to lose the last three tests and a certain Donald Bradman played a large part in our demise, although if you want to know the whole story ask Harold, but don't mention Gubby Allen! Another co-incidence. The touring side in England was the Indians. England won by 2 - 0 with one match drawn. They were captained by one of the most disastrous cricketers ever to step onto the international field. He rejoiced in the title of Maharajkumar of Vizianagram, could not bat or bowl and was tactically naive. He fell out with his star player who he sent home due to some footling language slight. Apparently he addressed his Captain in the wrong dialect. So the poor chap spent the next month or so going back and forth from England to India whilst his fate was settled. The Maharaja was well connected with the establishment both political and cricket so was able to inflict this punishment on their most talented player of whom he was extremely jealous. It is on record he bribed one of the team to run this star player out by giving him a gold watch!

In conclusion I hope all of you, who manage to get here today, will enjoy the event, meet some old adversaries and friends and look back on the occasion with fond memories.

It is a privilege and an honour to be President of this great table tennis club especially in its 75th year.

My association started in 1962 when my brother-in-law said he had joined a table tennis club and thought I should also join and play in his team. I had not played League table tennis since 1955 when I represented Achilles in Hermitage Road. My first match was for Ellenborough 'H' against Wood Green 'E' in Division 7A and I well remember having to play one of the League's great characters the unforgettable Vera Dovaston.

Since then table tennis life has really changed for me. I was soon enlisted on to the Committee and well remember the competition held to design a new badge for the club; the one we still use today, with the 'E' on top of the mountain. It was David Hope's design, inspired he claims by the CND Logo.

In 1971 I was elected General Secretary and during the next few years we did a great deal of work to the Bowes Pavilion on the Tottenham Sports Ground in Palmers Green, to turn the pavilion (which did not have any toilets) into a three table club. We installed two electric fires and insulated the timber framed walls. There is a story about Ken Silver and the boards he had nailed on the wall that fell off as he admired his handiwork. In 1972 David Hope, Ruth and Chris Monk (how sad to lose him this year) my wife Sylvia and I went away in August, just before the new season, to an hotel at Symonds Yat in Herefordshire. I wrote to Roy Evans, the President and General Secretary of the Table Tennis Association of Wales to ask him if there was a club close by willing to play a friendly against us. It was arranged that we went to Abergavenny, which was not all that close and the

match ended in a draw. Whilst on that holiday we posted all the lists of the club's teams for the coming season to every member of the club and completely filled up the small post box outside the hotel.

Then on 25th August 1973 I received a telephone call in the office from the groundsman, Mr Collins, to say that the Bowes Pavilion had burnt down during the night. The new season was only 4 weeks away and quite a few people thought that was the end of Ellenborough. However they had not reckoned with the tenacity of David and me. We had 17 teams in the league and were able to play at various venues during the first half of the season. We issued a separate fixture list to all clubs a copy of which I still have, then we searched around for a permanent home and eventually Mr Mures, our contact at London Borough of Enfield and a very good friend, came up with the small hut which had just been vacated by the W V A (Women's Voluntary Association). We set to work putting up two sets of lights and a curtain between the two tables. Dear Tom Chapman laid a timber floor over the badly cracked concrete floor and we were away. Oh yes and it did have toilets!

However this was not good enough for Ellenborough. We arranged a meal at an Indian Restaurant in Finchley and invited Ken Oliver, Chairman of Fairview Estates. We asked him to be our President and told him of our plans. He duly accepted and it was decided to go ahead and apply for a new hall to be built on the site and that the Council should put up the insurance money from the fire. We would apply for a Sports Council grant and the club members would go all out to raise funds. One particular event was an underwater sponsored swim in Ken's outdoor pool, the highlight of which featured member, John Pope a non-swimmer, being held under water and dragged the length of the pool to legitimately claim his sponsorship money. He worked as an engineer at the GPO, and his was by far and away the largest individual amount raised. All in all double the original target was achieved which enabled us to build a four table venue immediately. Originally we had planned for two tables with two more being added later.

At a big round table meeting in the hut the go ahead was given by the Council members and more particularly Captain Forbes of the King George V Playing Fields Association, the land owner. A club meeting of all members followed at which approval to the venture was unanimous. Ken organised the work and I watched the money. I remember having lunch with Ken at the Norfolk Restaurant in Enfield where we negotiated the final cost of the works, we got a bargain!

Over the next 20 years the club was extremely successful and evidence of which will be seen in the memorabilia on display. However it became clear that the clubhouse was looking old and needed refurbishment. I had become President and my firm WSW Associates started the long haul in designing the clubhouse as it appears today. The hours spent and the many disappointments experienced caused us to think it would never happen but at the last meeting with Sport England, Helen Ives the Project Manager (Community Club Development Programme) agreed to recommend a grant of £593,000 which together with £50,000 we said we would raise and a £3,000 grant from the North Middlesex League's 100 Plus Club meant that TSG (Construction) Ltd's revised tender was able to be accepted. The rules governing facilities forced us to spend a large portion of the money in areas that we, as table tennis players did not view as necessary, however the final result was well received by all members. David threw himself into obtaining grants from all over the place acquiring approximately £60,000 in four years and club members gave exceptional support by raising a significant amount of extra funds and wholehearted promotion to the venture.

To great acclaim and in the presence of many VIPs the new club opened in October 2006.

What of the future? Well we have planning permission to build another hall which we can start as soon as we have the funds. With our wealth of experience 'hope springs eternal'

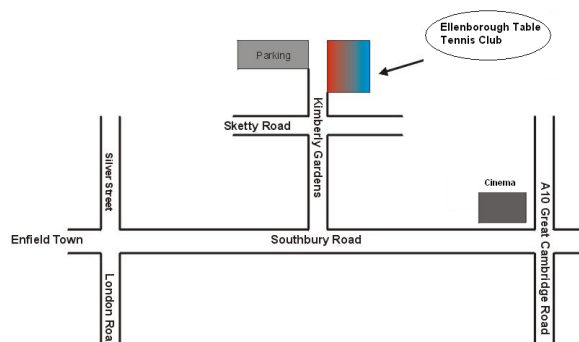
